If you have a FL Temporary Educator's Certificate that will **expire on June 30, 2019,** double check your Statement of Eligibility (SOE) to make sure you complete all requirements listed – and then apply for your Professional Educator's Certificate.

SPOTLIGHT:

Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)

The United States Constitution stipulates that providing education is the responsibility of each state. However, in the 1960s, in response to funding inequities between school districts, Congress determined the federal government must help ensure that students living in poverty had access to a good education and materials. The result was the Elementary and Secondary Schools Act of 1965 (ESEA), which offered states additional monies for this purpose – distributed to schools primarily through Title I. The Act must be reauthorized every five years.

In 2001, ESEA became No Child Left Behind (NCLB). Then with its 2015 reauthorization, the name changed again – this time to the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Federal funding is still allocated to schools through the Title programs, but along with revising its name, some requirements of the law were modified. Polk County Public Schools has adopted procedures to accommodate these changes.

NOTABLE CHANGES

Step aside, NCLB... ESSA has taken the stage! But no need to panic; items of interest to teachers are summarized below:

- ► "Highly Qualified Teacher" (HQ or HQT) requirements were eliminated in 2016-17.
- ► Under ESSA, teachers and paraeducators in Title 1 schools must still have appropriate certification/credentialing, which includes

ESE teachers assigned to teach general education courses to ESE students. Be aware: Florida Department of Education (FLDOE) rules regarding certification of instructional personnel apply to all teachers, not just those assigned to Title 1 schools.

- ► The NCLB term "unqualified" has been replaced with "ineffective" under ESSA.
- ► "Core academic subjects" have been eliminated, thus expanding the use of Title II funds for professional development.

MONITORING ESSA "COMPARABLE METHODS" FOR ESE TEACHERS:

Effective with the 2018-19 school year, ESE Teachers must be certified in Exceptional Student Education K-12 and in the assigned content area/s they are

assigned to teach or support. If you do not currently have all required certification coverages on your certificate, you must demonstrate subject matter expertise through a District-approved "Comparable Method" per Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C) 6A-1.0503.

"Comparable Methods" identified and agreed upon in consultation with ESE and PEA are as follows:

- 1) **Subject Area Test** (passed within the last 10 years), in the assigned content area
- 2) **15+ Semester Hours** of earned credit or a Minor in the field (with earned credit from an accredited college or university)
- 3) 2 years Occupational
 Experience in the content
 area confirmed through
 evaluations with a rating
 of "Highly Effective" or
 "Effective" and/or verification
 of documented Prior
 Teaching Experience

- 4) **Out of State Verification** of Subject Area Test OR
- 5) Grandfathered HOUSSE

- When renewing your teaching certificate online through VERSA, indicate you are an employee of **District 53**.

The FLDOE does not notify the District when you have passed an exam or when you add a subject to your teaching certificate.

DEAR AUNT AGONY

HELP! I was 'highly qualified' under 'No Child Left Behind'. Do I have to prove my qualifications again?

There's a bit of a change under ESSA, dearie. It's state certification that makes you 'qualified' to teach a subject now. So, if you've got either a FL temporary or professional certificate with coverage in the subject you teach, you may take a deep breath – you're qualified!

WHERE DO I FIND ...?

Where do I find access to the certification information that is on file for me with the district?

You can access **Staff Portal** 365 days a year to find information about your certification status (e.g., certificate validity period) and exam-related data on file. Your printable Certification Report Card is a reflection of this.

Where do I find the steps to submit payment to renew my upcoming expiring 2019 Professional Teaching Certificate?

The **Renewal Payment Form** is accessible in Staff Portal. You may also access Staff Portal to add a subject to your professional teaching certificate if you've passed an additional subject area exam.

Where do I find the amount of inservice points I've accumulated with the District?

Your District Inservice Record is found in **NetConnect**. You can reach out directly to the Professional Development Department for additional questions regarding your NetConnect Record or Transcript.

Where do I find a copy of my Florida Teaching Certificate?

1) Login to your FLDOE account. 2) On the Quick Start Menu under "View Documents," click on "Select" to print your certificate. 3) Print certificate.
